

Dr. H. S. Mick Dies Saturday

Reverend Harry S. Mick, DST, native of Micksbrg, who during more than 40 years in the ministry of the former Methodist and United Churches had occupied a number of important charges in Ontario and Quebec, died Saturday night in Windsor, where he had lived since 1934. Dr. Mick had been in poor health for two years.

Son of the late Samuel Mick and the former Elizabeth Ann Leach, he was born at Micksburg 77 years ago. He graduated from McGill University and Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, and was ordained as a Methodist minister in 1912. He served charges at East Angus, Que., Sherbrooke, Westboro and Renfrew, before accepting a call in 1934 to Central United church, the largest United church in Windsor, where he remained until his retirement in June, 1953, creating what is believed to be a record in the United church. Following his retirement he organized Victoria United, a suburban church in Sandwich East township. The congregation worshipped in a basement church until a new building was acquired last June, when Dr. Mick retired. He received the degree of Doctor of Sacred Theology from Chicago Univeristy.

In addition to his pastoral work, Dr. Mick wrote numerous articles for the Christian Century and the United Church Observer.

Dr. Mick was married in 1912 to the former Anne Fraser of Foresters Falls, who survives. They had no children. Also surviving are two brothers, A. C. Mick, Detroit, and Samuel, New Liskeard, and four sisters, Mrs. Cecile McIntyre, Burlington; Mrs. Russell McBride, Beachburg; Mrs. J. R. Childerhose, North Bay, and Mrs. Gordon Hamilton, Pembroke, while there are numerous other relatives at Micksburg and throughout the area.

Funeral services will be held Thursday at Windsor and burial will be in Pakenham.
